#### **4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT**

Culinary Challenge is a state-level event that ends a year's worth of work in the kitchen. As the 8th Annual Culinary Challenge wraps up it experienced another record year in attendance. Youth participation increased by 30% and has had a compound growth of 400% in the past five years. After the event, 95% of young people reported high levels of improvement in knife skills with all young people reporting some level of improvement. Youth also reported a great deal of teamwork and kitchen management skills developed because of the program. This high confidence in critical skills is a result of consistent work with 4-H agents and Volunteers. Youth reported an average of being engaged in 4-H activities for 3 hours a week. These skills have been identified as making a candidate highly qualified for positions in Culinary Arts, giving the young people who participate in Culinary Challenge programming a head start on career advancement.

Of the young people who participated in the Kentucky 4-H Culinary Challenge eight were from Montgomery County. The county fielded two Junior division teams and one Senior division team in this year's contest.

The 4-H Culinary Contest is only one part of the culinary experience that Montgomery County 4-H participates in. 4-H Culinary members also compete in the State 4-H Poultry Barbecue Contest: 3 Junior and 4 Senior members competing in Chicken Barbecue along with two Senior members competing in Turkey Barbecue and one Junior member competing in Egg Chef Challenge.

The Kentucky Department of Agriculture Farm to School Junior Chef Contest is the other culinary experience that Montgomery County 4-H members experience. This year Montgomery County team finished third overall in a contest that challenges teams to formulate recipes that can be incorporated into the school breakfast or lunch program. As a result of the teams' success, one member was recruited by a senior citizens home to be a member of the kitchen staff responsible for preparing nutritious meals for the home residents.

# **Modern Homesteading**

Meeting the needs of and attracting new clientele to Extension programming is an on going task. In an effort to do so the total Montgomery County Extension staff has developed a new and very successful Extension program series entitled Modern Homesteading.

Overview of Program Series

This series, which focused on practical, hands-on skills for gardening and food production, has garnered overwhelming interest. Topics covered included Fruit Tree Grafting, Bread Making, Gardening in Small Spaces, Food Preservation, Composting, and Wild Edibles. All classes reached full capacity, prompting waiting lists and generating increased demand for future offerings

# **Key Program Highlights**

 Fruit Tree Grafting Class: 40 participants attended the series. Paticipants learned how to graft Apple and Pear trees, with a focus on hands-on demonstrations. Participants also received guidance on post-grafting care, enabling them to cultivate their own fruit-bearing trees at home.
 Gardening in Small Spaces Class: This session covered essential gardening topics such as site selection, soil



types and amendments, raised bed construction, container gardening, and vegetable variety selection. Each participant left with a potted strawberry plant, which provided them with a personal, hands-on learning experience.

# **Participant Profile**

- First-Time Participants: 50% of attendees were new to Extension programs.
- New Gardeners/Fruit Producers: 75% of participants were beginners, showing the increasing interest in starting home-based gardening and fruit production projects.

# **Impact and Feedback**

• Knowledge Gains: 100% of participants reported that they gained valuable knowledge from both the Fruit Tree Grafting and Gardening in Small Spaces classes.

In conclusion, this series has successfully fostered greater community involvement in sustainable gardening practices, with a particular focus on empowering individuals to start producing their own food. The demand for future classes highlights the value and relevance of these Extension offerings, and efforts to expand the program are underway.

# Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) in Montgomery County: A Life-Saving Initiative

In the United States alone, nearly 1,600 lives are lost each day due to the lack of readily available Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs).

Sudden cardiac arrest (SCA) can affect anyone with a heart—this includes not just the elderly or those who are obese, but also young, healthy individuals who may have no apparent symptoms. While fit people are less likely to experience SCA, they are still at risk.

Recognizing this issue, the Montgomery County Extension Council reached out to the local Fire Department to inquire whether AED availability was a concern in the area. It was found that many businesses and organizations with high foot traffic in Montgomery County did not have AEDs, primarily due to their high cost. To address this, the council decided to sponsor 30 AEDs for public use.

The Family and Consumer Sciences Agent, along with the AED Committee, led the effort by creating an application process for businesses and organizations to apply for an AED. A total of 15 applicants were selected and approved by the committee. The remaining 15 AEDs were distributed throughout the county by the Fire Department Captain, who placed them in areas he identified as high need.

This initiative has made a significant impact on the survival rate for sudden cardiac arrest. With early defibrillation, the survival rate increases from around 5% to over 50%. While an AED will not treat non-shockable heart rhythms, it is the only treatment for sudden cardiac arrest. Early defibrillation is crucial—after 10 minutes without defibrillation or CPR, a victim's chances of survival decrease dramatically.

The Montgomery County community has expressed great gratitude for this life-saving initiative. Thanks to the efforts of the Extension Council and its partners, this project has provided invaluable support to public health and safety.
